For the 12th straight year, the annual Mummers Festival carries on the culture and hilarity of mummering while adapting to the realities of COVID-19

ou can't keep a good mummer down! While the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has assuredly affected the way many of us approach the upcoming holiday season, many individuals and groups have pivoted to make the best of a bad situation, keeping the spirit in the season even if the tried-and-true traditions we rely on may appear different in 2020.

### **FUN & FOOLISHNESS**

The fine folks at the Mummers Festival have determined to press on, bringing the fun, foolishness and plenty of opportunities to wear underwear as outterwear back again with their 12th an-

nual extravaganza from November 28th to December 12th.

"We just really felt that this year, given COVID-19 pandemic and everything has kind of collapsed around us in many ways ... we just thought that people enjoy this so much. How can we make sure that they can participate in something fun again and bring the educational component into it," shared

"We just felt, you know what, no way. We're not going to postpone or not have a 2020 festival. We just want to power ahead, and the board of directors is really committed to that as well. We said ok people love the Mummers, we're bringing the Mummers Festival back."

### **CULTURE & TRADITIONS**

The festival boasts a jam-packed schedule of events, workshops, lectures and performances taking place both physically and virtually.

With this year's theme of The Art of Mummering, organizers of the festival aim to examine the link between mummering culture and traditions and the local artisans who have incorporated the lore into their own works.

Among the can't miss highlights of the festival is Chainsaw Art with local artist Bill Guiney, a showcase presentation by professional Mummers Parade photographers Ritche Perez, Alex Stead and Greg Locke; an artist's panel featuring local artists Janet Peter, Doug Halliday, Tracie Boland and Dawn Hanlon; a special concert by local iconic musicians Bud Davidge and Paul Hamilton; and an interactive comedic mummer workshop featuring theatre artist Samantha Chaulk.

"There's so many wonderful artists and musicians and performers and storytellers in our community. We've always worked as much as we can with local artists, but this year let's really kind of do something. Mummering and

the mummering tradition appears in so many different formats and types of art, especially when we're going online, let's reach out to them and let's showcase their work too," explains McShane.

### **'LOCAL ARTISTS'**

"It's about that partnership with our local community and with our local artists to showcase what they do and how they so thoughtfully approach the tradition and incorporate it so beautifully in so many different ways."

Perhaps the cornerstone of the entire Mummers Festival is the signature and fan favourite

Mummers Parade. And while pandemic restrictions naturally have caused the physical event to be cancelled, that hasn't stopped event organizers from keeping the tradition alive.

Mummers from near and far are being asked to submit short 20 to 30 second video submissions that will result in a parade-length video montage, airing on Facebook on December 12. The deadline video submissions is December 1st.

### **'MUMMERS PARADE'**

Our biggest disappointment was that we just couldn't go ahead with the parade," says McShane. "But COVID-19 is not going to keep a determined mummer down. So we thought, what can we do?

> "We're going to create and stitch together a Mummers Parade that, hopefully, will have lots and lots of fun and colour and noise and excitement. And we want to showcase the
